Good evening madam mayor, councilpersons. I'm Keith Shillington, I reside at 1928 Leucadia Scenic Court, own a small coffeehouse at the corner of 2<sup>nd</sup> and E Streets, and frequently park, sometimes multiple times in the day, on 2<sup>nd</sup> Street.

On January 9<sup>th</sup>, I received an "Official Courtesy Notice" dated January 6<sup>th</sup> indicating that (in all caps) NO RESPONSE TO THE ORIGINAL PARKING CITATION(S) HAS BEEN RECEIVED.

My request to you, esteemed city council:

Perform a complete systems audit. Find the overlaps and gaps. Streamline, modernize and coordinate city systems. Determine how it is that office Griffith made the error (I'm guessing that the chalking system isn't foolproof). Determine how it is that Leah Sorensen can send a dismissal letter on January 5<sup>th</sup>, and yet the Citation Processing Center in Huntington Beach generates a dunning notice the following day.

You're still wasting my money, and I'm getting annoyed.
